Special Election – Proposition No. 1 Submitted by the City of Bellingham LEVY FOR NEW BELLINGHAM MEDIC ONE PROGRAM The City Council of the City of Bellingham, Washington adopted Ordinance No. 2004-10-069 concerning regular property taxes for emergency medical services in the City. If approved, this proposition would authorize regular property taxes of \$0.35(\$1,000 of assessed value in 2005 (for a total 2005 regular levy rate not to exceed \$3.16(\$1,000) and set the "limit factor" for 2006-2010 maximum levies at the change in the Consumer Price Index for medical care. This levy shall apply for the years 2005-2010. Additional revenues in excess of the RCW 84.55.010 limits would be dedicated solely for the new Bellingham Medic One program. Proposed Charter Amendment No. 1 Submitted By City Council The Bellingham City Council has adopted Resolution 2004-28 concerning a proposed amendment to Section 5.02 of the City Charter. If approved, this amendment would allow the Mayor and City Attorney to delegate the responsibility to execute contracts to administrative designees where permitted under state law. Attestation would no longer be required, but notarized signatures would be necessary when required under other law. Should this amendment be adopted? Special Election – Proposition No. 1 JAIL FACILITIES SALES AND USE TAX The Whatcom County Council passed Resolution No. 2004-050 concerning a proposition to authorize a sales and use tax for jail facilities. This ballot proposition would authorize the imposition of a sales and use tax, in addition to any other taxes authorized by law, of one tenth of one percent (0.1% - 10 cents for every \$100) to be used solely for costs associated with financing, design, acquisition, construction, equipping, operating, maintaining, remodeling, repairing, reequipping, and improvement of jail facilities that house inmates being held, charged, or convicted of misdemeanor and felony acts, as authorized by RCW 82.14.350. SAMPLE GENERAL ELECTION BALLOT
Whatcom County

November 2, 2004

TO VOTE, FOLLOW THE EASY STEPS OUTLINED HERE.

1. Using both hands, insert your ballot card in the slot. Insert your ballot card as far as it will go, positioning the two holes over the red pins on the voting device. Turn to the first ballot page.

2. Using the voting stylus, record your vote by punching the hole indicated by the arrow for the candidate or measure of your choice. Continue turning the ballot pages and vote your selection of candidates or measures. Be certain that you vote all ballot pages.

3. Lift your ballot from the red pins and remove it from the voting device.
